For parents, from whichever corner of the world they may hail, there is no substitute for total confidence in the professionalism and skill of your child's teachers. This is something we strive for at this school and judging from the growing lists of families who are making Awty their school of choice, it seems we are making progress towards achieving this goal we have set for ourselves.

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Students Lead Tsunami Relief Effort!



In response to the tsunami devastation, the students at The Awty International School joined together and designated January 10-14 as Tsunami Relief Week. The students went above and beyond all expectations, raising nearly \$8,000 for the relief effort.

Alejandro Cubria, a senior and Student Council President at Awty, along with members of the student council, led the effort and asked each student at Awty to participate by making a small cash donation. They placed donation boxes on campus and toured classrooms throughout the week to secure their goal of 100% participation from the student body.

As the second largest international school in the United States, The Awty International School student council felt strongly about supporting the relief effort. Many of the students at Awty have either visited or studied in the affected countries, or have relatives or friends who are living in the region. The student council members were amazed at the reaction of the student body.

"Knowing that community service and international understanding is at the heart of Awty's mission, and seeing such a tragedy, it was only fitting for us to help the victims," stated Alejandro Cubria. "The reaction to this effort was far better than expected. It was overwhelming."

As pledged, Mr. Anthony P. Banham, School Board of Trustees Chairman, matched every dollar raised by the students, up to \$5,000. This brought the total amount raised for the relief effort to nearly \$13,000.

"I am so proud of the students and their efforts to help with the devastation in South Asia," said Anthony Banham. "This typifies the international cultural consciousness that is an essential part of the Awty community."

Finally, Awty's Interact Club donated \$500 to the relief effort.

A check for \$17,133.96 was presented to UNICEF to help aid in the relief efforts in South Asia on Monday, January 24.

(Note: A small portion of funds raised was also collected by the students through the "Trick or Treat for UNICEF" program last fall.)

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The recent tragic events in South Asia remind us all of our fragility and essential interdependence. Students at Awty were quick to respond to the crisis and showed a level of practical engagement which was both heart-warming and helpful in its sincerity and depth. With crisis, comes opportunity; after the rain, a few rays of sunshine and a child's smile.

International schools celebrate the diversity of the human condition and ensure that every act, every symbol, every exchange involving teachers, administrators, students and parents reinforces the belief that, in the end, human diversity is an enrichment and a source of strength. Couple this together with Mrs. Awty's vision of a compassionate school where every child might achieve his or her full potential in an environment of trust and encouragement, and you have captured something of the reason why our school remains so attractive to so many families.

"A Letter from the Proviseur"

Dear Parents, Students, and Readers, For six months now I have had the honor and the privilege of directing the Bilingual French Section at Awty

International School.

Centrally located off the West Loop in Houston, Awty International School offers a complete academic curriculum based on bilingualism, from Preschool through the 12th grade.

A result of the fusion of a Texan school, offering the International Baccalaureate Program of Geneva, and an official French school, under the Ministry of Education and affiliated with the Mission Laïque Française, offering the French Baccalaureate, Awty is currently composed of 1145 students; 448 of whom are in the French Bilingual Section.

Faithful to the values of the Mission Laïque Française, "2 cultures, 3 languages", the Bilingual French Section of Awty International School has appointed itself the following several missions:

- Guarantee families, notably French expatriate families, a school that adheres to the official directives of the French National Ministry of Education. Thus its students are thereafter able to pursue their studies in France or in any French school worldwide.
- Take full advantage of the unique qualities of the school by providing students with the opportunity to become bilingual, offering up to 7 hours of English per week. For example, in Preschool, teaching is administered equally: one day in French, one day in English. In the Upper School, students may elect to follow the International Option of the Baccalaureate (courses in History, Geography and Literature are taught in English).
- Maintain the excellent standards of the school with regard to test scores (National Brevet Diploma for Middle School, Baccalaureate results).
- Promote French Language and Culture among the local community and within the student body at Awty International School.

The Mission of Awty far and away exceeds that of a simple language school. Awty welcomes students from every corner of the Earth (over fifty different nationali-

Chers parents, chers élèves, chers lecteurs,

Voilà 6 mois que j'ai le grand privilège et l'honneur de diriger la Section Bilingue Française d'Awty International School.

Très bien située à la périphérie ouest de Houston, Awty International School propose depuis la petite section jusqu'à la classe de terminale un cursus scolaire complet axé sur le bilinguisme.

Résultat de la fusion d'une école texane proposant à ses élèves le Baccalauréat international de Genève et d'un établissement scolaire, homologué par le ministère français de l'Education nationale et dépendant de la Mission laïque française, proposant à ses élèves le Baccalauréat français, Awty accueille 1145 élèves dont 448 pour la Section bilingue française.

Porteuse des valeurs de la Mission laïque française, " 2 cultures, 3 langues ", la Section française bilingue d'Awty International School s'est fixée plusieurs missions :

- Garantir aux familles, notamment aux expatriés français, une scolarité en conformité avec les instructions officielles du ministère français de l'Education nationale. Ainsi ses élèves peuvent poursuivre leurs études en France ou dans n'importe quelle école française.
- Tirer profit au maximum de la spécificité de l'école, en offrant la possibilité aux élèves de devenir bilingue en leur assurant jusqu'à 7 heures

- d'anglais par semaine. Par exemple, en maternelle, l'enseignement se fait à parité : 1 journée en français, 1 journée en anglais. Au lycée, les élèves peuvent suivre l'Option internationale du baccalauréat (enseignement de l'histoire, de la géographie et de la littérature en anglais).
- Maintenir l'excellence de ses résultats scolaires (diplôme national du brevet des collèges, baccalauréat)
- Promouvoir la langue française et sa culture auprès du public local et des autres élèves d'Awty International School.

Le projet scolaire d'Awty dépasse largement celui d'une simple école de langue. Awty accueille des élèves provenant de tout horizon géographique (plus d'une cinquantaine de nationalités différentes). L'école est un lieu social où des valeurs telles que le civisme, le respect, la fraternité, la tolérance et l'intégration se pratiquent au quotidien et fondent son projet scolaire. De nombreuses activités (cours en commun, classes vertes, sorties pédagogiques, clubs ou événements de la vie sociale) permettent aux élèves d'intégrer des groupes où se mêlent les élèves français, francophones, américains ou étrangers.

Awty International School est une école d'excellence. En témoignent ses résultats au baccalauréat (100% de réussite et 80% de mentions) et les orientations post-bac de ses élèves (grandes écoles, universités prestigieuses). Les élèves sont peu nombreux par classe et bénéficient ainsi d'un suivi individualisé.

Quoi de neuf depuis le début de cette année scolaire?

Une rentrée en Août à l'image des rentrées des année précédentes: de nouveaux professeurs ont rejoint l'équipe (Mmes Guidon, Meier et Srour), des nombreux élèves venant d'horizons divers sont arrivés, de nouveaux laboratoires de sciences ont été mis à leur disposition.

En septembre, ce furent les traditionnels voyages d'automne... Qui ont été encore une fois encore, de grands moments pour nos élèves.. Les 4ièmes se préparant sur notre terrain de foot à cette grande aventure que va être le voyage à Big Bend; les 6ième visitant Fort Alamo; les 5ième à Austin pour explorer la capital politique du Texas ... et les Terminales descendant le Buffalo Bayou. Là il faut que je m'arrête un peu, car ça été un moment de bravoure pour nombre de nos seniors, accompagnés de leurs professeurs, du Directeur d'Awty et du Proviseur. Aussi étonnant que cela puisse paraître, le Buffalo Bayou (entre

Woodway et Allan Parkway Landing) fait plus penser à une rivière de Bornéo ou du Viet-nam...un monde étrange de verdure, de senteurs, de bruits, serpentant aux pieds des immeubles d'Uptown. Tracer son chemin sur cette voie d'eau a été une expérience intéressante, parfois difficile pour certaines de nos élèves qui ont du prendre sur elles pour poursuive leur route dans ce milieu si différent de Galleria ou du Mémorial City Mall.

Octobre, Novembre,
Décembre ont vu une succes-

sion de festivités: les citrouilles d'Halloween chassées par les dindes de Thanksgiving, elles même dégagées par Frosty le bonhomme de Neige et Rudolf le renne au nez rouge, le tout sous la surveillance des Rois-mages qui attendent leurs galettes sous le bras que Janvier arrive.

Chacun de ces moments sont commémorés dans notre école, par un spectacle ou un moment de partage: le Fall Fun festival, le repas de Thanksgiving, l'allumage du sapin de Noël... des moments qui rassemblent un communauté scolaire et qui fait qu'Awty International School est si particulière.

Janvier est le mois du Bac Blanc pour les élèves de terminale et de premières et du Brevet Blanc pour ceux de 3ième. C'est une bonne occasion de faire le point sur le travail accompli depuis le début de l'année.


ties). The school is a social entity wherein values such as civic duty, respect, tolerance and integration are practiced on a daily basis and form the very basis of its mission. Numerous activities (classes in common, recreational activities and sports, field trips, school events) give students the opportunity to become a part of a group in which French, French-speaking, American and other foreign nationals are mixed.

Awty International School is a school of excellence. Its Baccalaureate results speak for themselves (100% success, 80% with honors), as does the list of its students' Post-Baccalaureate institutions of learning (elite and prestigious universities, 'grandes écoles'). Class sizes are small, thus students benefit from individualized and attentive instruction.

What's been going on since the start of this school year?

Back-to-School in August just as in preceding years: new teachers joining the team (Ms. Gidon, Ms. Meier and Ms. Srour), students from many different horizons joining the student body, and new science laboratories being made available for the benefit of all.

In September, there were the traditional Fall Trips...which were once again a great experience for the students... The 8th grade did a dry-run on the soccer field for the great camping adventure that is their Big



Bayou. Here I must pause, for this was a moment of courage for many of our Seniors, along with their teachers, the Head of School and their Proviseur. As amazing as this may seem, Buffalo Bayou (between Woodway and Allen Parkway Landing) rather calls to mind a river in Borneo or Vietnam... a strange world of greenery, scents, and sounds that snakes around the heels of Uptown's great buildings. To follow its path, along this water-trail, was quite an interesting experience - at times a difficult one for certain female students who had to take it upon themselves to navigate this byway so different from the Galleria or Memorial City Mall.

October, November, and December saw a succession of festivities: the pumpkins of Halloween chased by the Thanksgiving turkeys, who themselves were banished by Frosty the Snowman and Rudolf the Red-nosed Reindeer, all under the watchful eyes of the Three Wise Men, awaiting the King's cake that would arrive under January's arm.

Each of these moments is commemorated at our school, through performances or occasions to share: the

Fall Fun Festival, the Thanksgiving Meal, the Holiday Tree-lighting Ceremony. These are moments that bring an entire school community together...moments that make Awty the unique, special place it is.

January is the month of the Practice Baccalaureate for students in 12th grade and the Practice Brevet for those in 9th. It's the perfect time to take stock of all that we have accomplished since the beginning of the year.

Marie Le Pichon Receives Scholarship From FACC

On September 21, 2004 the French-American Chamber of Commerce presented a \$5,000 scholarship to the Awty International School. Ms. Marie Le Pichon is this year's FACC scholar.

Marie is 17 and is studying in Terminale or 12th grade of the French Bilingual Section of the Awty School. Her siblings Sarah, 13, and Thomas, 10, are also attending the French section of the school.

In 1995, the FACC voted to award a scholarship to help deserving students continue their education in Texas. The criteria for eligibility are among others, that the recipient should be a full-time student of Awty School, of French nationality and preparing the French Baccalaureate or the full International Baccalaureate. Moreover the student, both in attitude and accomplishments, must be a merit to the school.

Marie is involved in many activities at school: she participates in the Awty Singers during lunch break and the Madrigal (select choir) after school. She is also a member of the Texas Private School Music Education Association. She says, 'I have a passion for art which has driven me to work with teachers from Awty to further develop my artistic abilities as well as help me with my portfolio that I will submit with my college application. I spend four hours a week practicing Capoeira, a Brazilian martial art, and I just joined Red Cross'.

About her future, she says, 'My long term college plans are to get a BS and MS in Game Art and Design. I am applying to Art Institute of California in Los Angeles,

Parsons in Paris, Savannah College of Art and Design and the Art School of Florence. I want to specialize in Game Art and Design because it combines art and technology, two of my interests. It is a fairly recent major, specific to only a handful of colleges.'

The FACC wishes good luck to Marie in all her endeavors and to start with, 'bonne chance pour le bac'.

The first scholarship was granted in 1996 and since then, seven students have received a financial support from the FACC. Every scholarship is made possible by the funds raised during the annual Beaujolais Festival.

Awty Students Continue Support of Orphanage in Bolivia

The students gain community service hours while helping the orphanage with chores such as feeding the animals, clearing fields, and washing clothes. They also help the children in the orphanage with their studies.

The Director of the Hogar San Ignacio de Loyola was so grateful for the students' help last summer, she sent the following letter to Mrs. Gharibeh extending her gratitude to the students, their parents, and the entire Awty Community...

With the help of the Awty students who spent some time over the summer 2004 in the fields and at the farm, the center was able to provide for the meals of the children at the center as well as for the animals in the farm. Camp Spike 'n' Wave

The first thing that hits you when you arrive at Camp For All, the location of Camp Spike 'n' Wave, is the incredible sense of belonging. The camp seems to rise up out of nowhere, like an oasis in the middle of a desert. It is a special place; a place where everyone is accepted, and having a disability is an advantage. I say this because all the campers are bound together by their disability, whatever it may be. Race, creed,

color, financial standing - none of these things matter, all that matters is that the campers are together and that, for one week, they will be able to forget their troubles and just have fun. I spent one incredible week with these kids, and I walked away with enough memories to last ten lifetimes.

I was a counselor for Camp Spike 'n' Wave, a camp for children with epilepsy. Before you ask, I do not have epilepsy. As a counselor, having epilepsy was not required of me (although some counselors are former campers). My job was to have fun with the kids, and to make sure that they had the most incredible experience of their lives in the safest possible way. I was neither paid for my services, nor forced to give them. Did I have an ulterior motive? Sure, I had service hours to fill. But this is beside the point. There are many ways to serve your community. I chose Camp Spike 'n' Wave because it truly is a once-in-a-lifetime experience.

Many prospective counselors are put off by the idea of spending a week of their summer looking after kids. I

know: it's babysitting without the perks of cable TV and good wages. However, these are not your typical kids. Of course the camp is no cakewalk. Epilepsy is not necessarily difficult to handle, but many campers have other problems, ranging from ADD to mental retardation. It is a challenge to look after these campers for a week, but it is also a priviledge. Knowing that you are providing these campers with opportunities that they would rarely otherwise have is an unbelievably great feeling.


Activities include archery, horseback riding, swimming, biking, dancing, nature, and barnyard studies, high and low ropes, canoeing and fishing. Camp Spike 'n' Wave offers the full spectrum of activities to cater to any taste. Just to be clear, the counselors are able to partake in these activities as well, and you'll often end up having as much fun as your kids. However, the real fun, believe it or not, comes from the immense responsibility counselors carry. These kids look up to their counselors. They envy them, they emulate them, and they strive to impress them. When a counselor uses this to his or her advantage, they can make a camper accomplish anything. I had campers who were terrified of anything from bike riding, to barnyard animals, to canoeing Lead by example. The camper thinks, "Hey, if they can do it, then I can do it too!" Actually, the inverse is truer. Watching a camper conquer his fear of heights to experience the rush of the zip-line, the counselor thinks, "Hey if he can do that, imagine what I can do."

Nothing compares to the experience of Camp Spike 'n' Wave. I gave up a week of my summer so that I could spend it in the company of some of the finest people I know. Like I said at the start, I have many memories. I remember Tom, Colin, Erik, Cody, and Jay. They are five young men who proved that, when faced with adversity, humans can and will achieve anything.

Letter From The APPA President

On behalf of the Association of Parents and Personnel of The Awty International School, I would like to send you my warmest wishes for the New Year. I hope that 2005 will bring you all the best, peace, love, and prosperity. As we begin this

new year, we reflect on the past and plan for the future.

The APPA History is so closely linked with Awty School History that one cannot be revisited without discussing the other.

The Parents Association of Awty began with the founding of the school in 1956 by Mrs. Kathleen Awty. At the opening there were fewer than 30 students in the Pre-school, with a monthly tuition of eighteen dollars and seventy-five cents. During this time the parents, both European and Texan, were working hard for the common good of the school. From the beginning there was a blending of influences which uniquely shaped the school.

By 1969, the parents' organization had a long tradition of service and fundraising for the school. In 1970, the Middle School was added, followed by the Upper School in 1973. During all of these years the parents' participation enriched the life of the school with their supportive work. By the end of the seventies, Mrs. Awty merged her school with the French School of Houston. With this blending, the parents group added a vital, extra dimension to the school.

By 1980, the parents' organization was renamed the Awty Parents and Personnel Association (APPA). With an eye toward the legacy of parental involvement at Awty, we forge the onging history as families continue to enrich the school with their involvement, and the APPA tradition of school support evolves.

Future plans are to work with the school to improve our website, as we strive to reach all of the school community. We want to hear from you. We will continue to raise funds

to assist the school with its wish list.

Last year in 2003 we partially funded the new patio, so loved by the students for study, lunch, or meeting friends. Additionally we helped to fund the new fencing of the soccer field. Over the past years, the APPA has donated thousands of books to the school's three libraries, along with tens of thousands of volunteer hours offered by our tireless members. Some events hosted by the APPA include the Welcoming Coffees, Pot Luck Supper, Holiday Market, International Festival, Bookfair, Teacher In-Service Luncheon, and Teacher Appreciation Breakfast. The APPA organizes the room parents and thanks them for year-round class support.

We appreciate all of you for helping us to continue the tradition of supporting the school through our volunteer activities, whether in the classroom or fund raising capacity.

The APPA is not a melting pot, but rather a diverse stew where we share friendship, language and culture, from which all of us are enriched. The role of the APPA continues to expand and diversify, just as our membership. We thank you for your continued support.



What has the Booster Club accomplished?





letter from the chairman

Dear Parents and Friends of The Awty International School,

am very pleased to report that the school has had another successful year. In all areas of school operation, time and talent, resources and funds have been translated into action and accomplishment in a variety of different ways by all members of the Awty community, from parents, students and teachers, through the members of the administration, volunteers and the Board of Trustees.

Enrolment continued to grow steadily over the past year. Our graduating class of 72 students in June 2004 achieved outstanding results. The IB pass rate at Awty was 96% compared to a North American average of 78% and 81% worldwide. Awty's French Baccalaureat pass rate was 100%, with 81% Assez Bien or better. Like you, I am proud to pay tribute to the teachers whose dedication and diligence across all grade levels of the school have made possible these and other accomplishments throughout the past year.

Many of the physical changes which have taken place on the campus offer tangible evidence of the investments which the Board is making in the future of the school. The new Lower School building opened officially in October 2003; in sum-

mer 2004, two new science laboratories were added in the Middle and Upper School, a new theater area was completed as was the new Courtyard area. The school also was able to

purchase eight acres of land a few hundred yards north of the present campus, which we intend to use, in the short term, for much needed parking but which, longer term and, subject to funding, will provide us with a full sports field and another access point to North Post Oak Lane.

Moreover, subsequent to the end of the school year 2003-2004, we were able to substantially strengthen our Development (now renamed Advancement Department) with a Director of Advancement and additional staff. This will be key to the success of our future fundraising activities.

This Annual Report 2003-2004 is a testament to the generosity of the many donors who have made gifts to our Annual Fund as well as various unrestricted gifts to the school and have participated in the Gala. These gifts have allowed us to limit the increases in tuition over the past few years and keep the costs of attending

'ai le plaisir de vous annoncer que l'Ecole a connu une fois de plus une année fructueuse. message from the head of school

hrough the years here at The Awty International School, students, parents, alumni, teachers and friends have worked together to make a difference in the education of Awty students. With their support, Awty has become a diverse, academically challenging school which prepares students for success in an increasingly complex and rapidly changing world.

2003-2004 saw the school make considerable strides in terms of our physical surroundings. The new Lower School building opened in October 2003 as did the new Senior Lounge. Since then the school has built a new staff room and has converted three former classrooms into two new Science laboratories over summer 2004 to create a six-laboratory Science wing in the Middle and Upper Schools.

The new Courtyard in the Middle and Upper School area, which opened in summer 2004, has provided students with a refreshment/seating area for break times. Our new Theatre-in-the-Round at the back of the Performing Arts and Athletic Center had its successful inaugural production, Moliere's *Tartuffe*, in November 2004.

After many years of playing soccer in the half light of the Texan winter, new floodlights on the soccer field, jointly funded by the Booster Club and the school, were turned on in January 2005.

Our enrollment continues to indicate a healthy and increasing interest locally and internationally in this school. From 970 students in summer 2000, we have grown steadily to our current level of 1150 students from 52 nationalities.

As we plan for the future, (Awty will celebrate its Golden Jubilee in 2006), we are mindful of the past and the progress that has been made with the help of supporters of the

school up until now. As a non-profit school, The Awty International School relies heavily upon the tuition and fees we receive from parents to maintain the high quality of education we offer our students everyday. However tuition and fees only cover about 80% of the actual costs of educating your child at Awty.

We need the support of parents, alumni and corporations to continue to bridge "the excellence gap" between what we receive in revenue and our total operational costs. By increasing contributions to the school's endowment, we can in time become less dependent upon tuition income. This must eventually be our goal over the long term and we look to our parents and friends for support and help in achieving this objective for our children at Awty.

In this Annual Report, I am therefore delighted to offer my sincere thanks to all those parents and friends who have contributed most generously to the school over

the past year, and who by doing so have helped to provide financial aid to qualifying students and helped to keep academic standards high and tuition rises to a minimum.

Thank you, from all of us at Awty, for your continued commitment to the ideals and to the future of this remarkable school.

l'Ecole Internationale Awty, les élèves, parents, anciens élèves, enseignants et amis ont travaillé de concert au fil des années pour offrir aux élèves d'Awty une éducation exceptionnelle. Awty est, grâce à leur soutien, une école dynamique où règne la diversité, elle prépare les élèves à réussir dans un monde en perpétuel changement et de plus en plus complexe.

En 2003-2004 l'Ecole a fait des progrès considérables sur le plan de l'environnement. La nouvelle Ecole Primaire a ouvert ses portes en octobre 2003 et le salon des élèves de Terminale (Senior Lounge) aussi. Depuis lors, l'Ecole a fait construire une nouvelle salle du personnel et a converti trois salles de classe en deux nouveaux laboratoires de sciences au cours de l'été 2004, créant ainsi une aile comprenant six laboratoires de sciences pour les Collège et Lycée.

La nouvelle cour des Collège et Lycée, aménagée en été 2004, est une aire de récréation où les élèves peuvent déjeuner et se retrouver entre les classes. La mise en scène inaugurale et réussie de Tartuffe de Molière a eu lieu en novembre 2004 dans notre nouveau théâtre circulaire à l'arrière de l'actuelle Salle des Sports et Spectacles (PAAC).

Pendant plusieurs années, nous avons joué au football à la lueur de l'hiver Texan, mais depuis janvier 2005 de nouveaux projecteurs, financés par le Booster Club et l'Ecole, éclairent le terrain de sports.

Nos inscriptions indiquent que l'intérêt porté à notre Ecole sur le plan international et local augmente sans cesse: nous sommes passés de 970 élèves en été 2000 à 1150 élèves à ce jour et 52 nationalités sont représentées.

Awty célèbrera son Jubilé d'Or en 2006, mais n'oublions pas pour autant le passé car ce progrès, qui a été réalisé jusqu'alors, n'a été possible que grâce à l'aide des supporters de l'Ecole. Etant une école à but non lucratif, l'Ecole Internationale Awty table entièrement sur les frais de scolarité et les cotisations des parents qui contribuent à l'excellence de notre éducation pour nos élèves. Les frais de scolarité et les cotisations ne couvrent cependant que 80% des frais actuels d'éducation à Awty.

Nous avons besoin de l'aide des anciens élèves et des entreprises si nous voulons combler l'écart entre ce que nous recevons en revenus et les frais de fonctionnement. En coopérant davantage au fonds d'investissement, nous serons moins dépendants du revenu provenant des frais de scolarité. Cela sera notre objectif à long terme; nous espérons que parents et amis nous aideront à atteindre cet objectif pour le bien de nos enfants à Awty.

J'ai donc le plaisir d'offrir, dans ce rapport annuel, mes remerciements sincères à tous les parents et amis qui ont généreusement apporté l'année dernière leur contribution à l'Ecole, ce qui nous a permis d'obtenir une aide financière pour les élèves méritants, de maintenir une éducation de qualité tout en gardant une majoration minimale des frais de scolarité.

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
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
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
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Mission Statement
